- Spills and debris are not hard to spot on hardwood floors, which makes it easier to ensure those things are completely cleaned up

Of course, individual use and circumstances will determine the upkeep necessary for your wood floors, but with <u>regular sweeping or vacuuming</u> followed by mopping, your hardwood floors should look great for many years to come.

Hardwood Vs. Carpet: Quantifying Dirt's Impact on Carpet

While dirt can be easily removed and has little to no impact on the integrity of wood floors, it can be more detrimental to carpet. Dirt wears down the fibers of carpet, which is why higher-traffic areas of carpeted floors appear duller than the rest of the floor. Stains can also have largely negative effects on the livelihood of carpet.



In addition to wood floors being easier to keep clean than carpet, wood floors have proven more durable and long-lasting than carpet. Properly finished and well-maintained hardwood floors can last for decades while a top-quality carpet can last up to 15 years.



Hardwood Floors Increase a Home's Resale Value

As with any investment, it's smart to think about getting the most value out of it and even recouping a return on it if you choose to. Real estate is no doubt one of the biggest investments most people will ever make. Flooring is a key component in determining the value of real estate. Decisions about property are important, and the fact that buyers will pay more for hardwood than carpet has proven true time and again.

A 2013 study of homebuyer preferences using data from the National Association of Realtors found that more than half of the people looking to buy a home would pay about \$2,000 more for a property with hardwood flooring than one without it. It did not break down whether hardwood vs. engineered wood made any difference.

Experts have a similar opinion as buyers regarding the value of wood floors in a home. The National Wood Flooring Association shared the results of a survey of real estate agents in the United States. The survey revealed:





- 99 percent of the real estate agents surveyed believe homes with hardwood floors are easier to sell
- 82 percent of agents believe homes with wood floors sell faster
- 90 percent believe those homes sell for up to 10 percent more money

The all-natural core of the planks consists of either hardwood or plywood, and a layer of hardwood veneer is attached to the top surface. This differs from laminate, which uses artificial material designed to look like wood rather than actual wood.



Because reclaimed hardwood has spent many years exposed to elements that caused it to expand and contract based on the moisture levels in the air, it comes to you in a settled state. The wood will be especially sturdy and durable. On Superior Hardwoods of Montana's list of top 10 reasons to choose reclaimed lumber, you can see many other reasons this type is a good option.

How Buildings Eventually Become Reclaimed Wood

Collecting and processing reclaimed hardwood lumber in order to make reclaimed wood flooring is a detailed process. It starts with deconstructing buildings largely by hand. Acrew usually removes the roof first. Getting rid of the ceiling and roof structure reveals the usable pieces on the inside of the building, such as brown barn board that made up the interior walls, additional beams, joisting and weathered barn siding. The crew separates timbers into two categories —hand-hewn and as-is. Next, they pack and ready the reclaimed lumber for shipping to the reclaimed lumber manufacturing company. The manufacturing company that receives the lumber goes through a labor-intensive period to prepare the lumber for use or processing, which includes:

- De-nailing
- Defecting
- Stacking
- · Placing stickers in strategic spots

The lumber used for flooring is the best quality of all the material inspected.

The <u>barnwood flooring we offer at Superior Hardwoods of Montana</u> comes from carefully deconstructing barns no longer in use, salvaging the wood and refinishing it. This process takes the place of aggressively demolishing the barn and discarding the wood used to build it.



When barns are torn down or the buildings fall into bad condition, you can preserve a lot of that wood. We repurpose the best of what's left and handcraft it into gorgeous flooring. The options include anything from darker, rustic options to light remilled wood.

The repurposing occurs in our mill shop, where we turn outflooring that still retains the character from the wood's previous life. CHAPTER 4: TYPES OF PREFINISHED WOOD FLOORING

When considering the final look of your wood flooring, you'll want to the think about the finish, which is the top coat over the wood that protects and seals wood. Damage to a floor may come from regular daily use, moisture or stains.

Prefinished wood flooring has the finish applied during the manufacturing process, before you receive it. This eliminates the need for you to apply a topcoat to the wood after installation.

Factory prefinished wood is completed with a zero VOC finish. Before the wood is sent to you, it's been passed under an ultraviolet light that helps to both cure the wood and keep the color intact. A prefinished topcoat is more durable than two or three polyurethane coats added onsite and cured by air-drying after wood leaves the factory.



You can install prefinished wood more quickly because the flooring has already been sanded and finished. You can walk on floors as soon as you've finished installing them, because drying and curing time is not needed. They can also be sanded and refinished several times over the years, if necessary.

CHAPTER 6: HOW TO INSTALL HARDWOOD FLOORS

Having your hardwood flooring properly installed will help ensure you get the most value from it and enjoy the beauty of your investment. The National Wood Flooring Association has several recommendations for properly installing hardwood floors. While we recommend consulting a professional to have your floors installed, if you want to save on the cost to install hardwood floors, you can do it yourself by following these tips.

Simple Flooring Installation Process

Installing hardwood flooring is a major improvement that can enhance your space, and it's worth your while to properly prepare the subfloor before the installation project begins. This means making sure the surface you plan to lay the flooring on is clean, level and structurally sound. You may have to sand down any areas that rise too high or fill those that dip too low.

Acclimating Your Hardwood Floors

Before installing the wood on your floors, it needs to be acclimated. This process allows wood to adjust to the moisture content of the environment. Not allowing proper hardwood floor acclimation can lead to gaps, cracks and squeaks. You should leave your wood out in the space where you will install it for seven to ten days. Don't store the wood in any place other than where it will be installed, such as in your garage or on your patio.



How to Install Hardwood Floors

Whether you plan to hire a professional or install the flooring yourself, it's useful to know what to expect during the installation process. There are three main techniques used to install wood floors. Which you use depends on what type of wood you have and where the flooring will be installed. The methods are:



- Nailing down solid wood floors with a pneumatic nailer or stapler is the most common technique.
- Solid hardwood floors may also be glued down by adhering the material to the subfloor.
- Floating the floor means attaching the planks to each other and not the subfloor. Engineered hardwood planks can be floated on almost any type of surface, including plywood and concrete, and fitted together using a tongue and groove system and glue.

When your flooring is being installed, mix the bundles of planks to attain a nice variance in shade and colors on your floor. The variety will bring out the natural beauty of the wood and alleviate the possibility patches of your floor that are noticeably lighter or darker than the rest of the floor.



If you install wood flooring row by row and the area has something in the way that breaks the flow, such as a fireplace or doorway, use a miter saw to alter the planks, so they frame the obstruction. Corners may be cut using a jigsaw.

Placement of Wood Flooring

Solid hardwood floors should be installed in spaces at ground level or above because the wood expands and contracts according to the moisture and temperature around it.



If you install engineered hardwood floors over an existing floor, you eliminate the work of removing the old flooring. You also have the added benefits of soundproofing and insulation from the old floor.

If there are any irregularities in the level or smoothness of the old flooring, you'll have to correct those before placing your wood flooring on top of it. Also, the new floor will raise the flooring level, which could affect transitions to hallways or adjoining rooms.

Regardless of whether you use solid hardwood or engineered hardwood, you should know what direction the floor joists that support the subfloor go in. Your wood plank should ideally be installed perpendicular to the floor joists.


Maintenance of Wood Flooring

Scratches can be repaired with touch-up kitsfound at most local home improvement stores. You can address major scratches by refinishing the flooring.

Durability of Hardwood Floors



Hardwood floors are durable and last quite a long time. It's common for homes and buildings that are more than 100 years old and have been properly cared for to still have their original flooring. The maintenance of hardwood floors is relatively simple. They need sweeping and occasional cleaning with a wood floor cleaner. Other cleaners may be too acidic and may break down the finish of your flooring. Despite being a common practice in old times, wax should never be applied to hardwood flooring as it may prevent finishes from adhering to the wood should you choose to refinish your flooring in the future.



Jenka scale rankings show the relative hardness of different wood species used to make flooring and how durable the wood is. Denser and harder woods have a higher ranking. However, the scale only applies to solid wood and would not be an accurate form of measurement for engineered wood.

Another solid mark in the pro column among the pros and cons of hardwood flooring? The excellent insulation. Whether you choose engineered or reclaimed hardwood, these planks provide an extra layer in your home, to protect you from cold in the winter and heat in the summer.
